Karijini NP - The Anzac Long Way Home - 17 to 25 April 2017

Following the Easter long weekend escape at Murchison House Station, we shall embark on an extended journey home via Shark Bay, Coral Bay, Cape Range NP (Exmouth/Ningaloo), Karijini NP and Kennedy Range NP

Combining two LWE's to gain a holiday of 12 days, made of up of only 5 days annual leave (for those who still need to apply for it) we believe it's a great opportunity to see a chunk of the north west.

Continuing on from the Murchison House Station trip for most, we then go on to do 8 nights and 9 days of touring.

The rough plan is to spend 1 night in Shark bay or Coral bay, 4+ nights in Karijini, a chance of 1 night around Kennedy Ranges, and a final night within a day's drive from home around Murchison or surrounds. Most of this is during the second week of the school holidays so we expect crowds at all major caravan parks but the plan is to be at rest areas and bush camping facilities.

Self-sufficient minimalist camping is essential for the remote area travel with a minimum of 20L surplus of each fuel and water.

No pets are permitted on this extended trip due to entering a few National Parks.



Esperance Trip – Saturday, 28 January, 2017 (Day 1)

We got to Kelmscott Getaway Outdoors on time at 8.15 for an 8.30 departure. Travis & Katie and Robert & Wendy were already there and Keith & Josan arrived shortly after us. We were meeting Jo Norton and Dominique & Francine at camp in Esperance. After a quick briefing, we headed off down Brookton Highway, arriving at Corrigin around 10.30 for morning tea and fuel.



We left Corrigin at about 10.50 and our next stop was at Lake King for lunch. We arrived at about 1.30. While it had been warm when we arrived at Corrigin, by the time we arrived at Lake King the temperature must have been nudging 40. There had been chatter on the CB about the outside temperature readings as we drove to Lake King, with one car actually reporting a reading of 40 degrees at one point. Needless to say, we found ourselves some shade for lunch. While we were there, heat notwithstanding, Robert managed to get his drone up in the air for a birds-eye view of the township.

Lunch didn't last long, as we were all keen to get back into our air-conditioned vehicles to cool off! An hour later, we stopped at Ravensthorp for fuel, ice-cream and a leg stretch. Then it was back

into our vehicles for the final push through to Esperance, arriving at the Bathers Paradise Caravan Park about 5.15, almost 9 hours after we left Kelmscott. The total distance from Perth to Esperance is 696 kilometres.



We had time to set up camp before dinner, thankfully in cooler conditions. The temperature in Esperance was, by then, only around 30 degrees. The caravan park was quite good, with plenty of trees, shade and grass, with Ultra Mesh ground sheets already laid at each site. And we were very close to the camp kitchen and a shower block.

We were looking forward to our stay in Esperance, although the weather forecast for the week ahead was not all that promising.

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CLIFF HEAD NORTH - Saturday 18 February 2017

This overnighter was our re-entry into the world of camping after a rather lengthy absence. It was ably led by Tony Richards who greeted us at the meet up point at Drovers Shopping Centre on Wanneroo Road. He had updated us during the preceding week with a change of meet-up point and weather updates. It was to be 40C by day and 26C by night over the weekend! But by then we were committed. At the meet-up point in the car-park, the youngest member of our group, Nathan (1) son of Julie and Jason, decided Tom looked close enough to his maternal grandfather to pass muster and so reached out for a cuddle. Shortly afterwards he discovered that the very similar sunglasses and hat weren't quite enough to last, and so returned to the arms of his parents. And what a cheerful and placid child he proved to be. Good on you Jason and Julie!

Nine cars set off with a tenth (John Cahill) meeting us at camp. If you'd never heard of Cliff Head North you would not be alone. It's not really far from Perth, 30km south of Dongara. With a mere 285km from Drovers up Wanneroo Road and Indian Ocean Drive, it was an easy 3-hour trip, which we planned to break at Jurien Bay. We departed roughly on time and arrived in Jurien for a 20 minute brunch/ lunch/ leg stretch.

Apart from some upgrading roadworks on Wanneroo Road the trip was quite uneventful. There was plenty of bush along the way, interspersed with the turn-offs to many small settlements – Guilderton, Seabird, Ledge Point, Lancelin (site of Australia's best beer garden, they claim), Grey, the Pinnacles, Cervantes. We resolved to do some research on return to Perth and find out what the current status is of the shack dwellers at Wedge and Grey.

We noted a beautiful spot to visit at a later date – the look-out over the beautiful Nilgen Nature Reserve, not far from the Defence Force training area and the Wedge turn-off. That reserve should be spectacular in spring and only 100km north of Drovers. This is an area of banksia heathland with many large eucalyptus and a battalion of tall flower spikes of Xanthorrhoea (grass trees or balga). At the Wangarren Nature Reserve there was another look-out and the road continued close enough to the shore to spot the blue and turquoise waters and the sparkling white breakers over the off-shore reef that the area is famous for. To our east there were inland dunes of shining white sand. As Indian Ocean Drive has only been opened quite recently there were plenty of new rest areas complete with loos, shelter - and even sculpture.

Many of our group dropped in to the second (older) shopping centre at Jurien where there was a recommended bakery, the Bay Bakery Cafe. Tom's new adopted grandson, Nathan, had a run on the soft green grass. My favourite sign in Jurien was the hairdresser's in the same shopping centre, so artfully titled SIZZARZ.

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By the time we left Jurien the temperature had reached 41C. We were glad that our Subaru's were fitted with air-conditioning. Just after 1pm we passed Cliff Head South, another rest area you can stay for up to 72 hours. Shortly afterwards we reach our destination at Cliff Head North which has basic facilities - rubbish skip and long-drops. The campsites are grass on sand, in little clusters, spread out along a track meandering along the coast, though with little shade. Never mind, many of us brought our own shade. We set up two camps - the "youth annex" to the north - which Tom and Jenni were honoured to be admitted to - and everyone else to the south. There was plenty of room for Nick and Leanne's camper trailer. The rest of us set up tents, swags or gazebos.

The happy hour began a few hours later and was quite 'cosy' as we all fitted our camp chairs in between the tents. As we were getting into the party spirit, John Cahill arrived, having spent the past 30 minutes driving up and down the coastal tracks trying to find us. He'd failed to get anyone's attention by CB radio or SMS, perhaps because we were enjoying ourselves so much and not paying much attention to the comms. John's arrival prompted a discussion of mindfulness (because he'd been teaching a course on it before he left Perth).



Tony was meanwhile getting quite funny on a bottle of wine, but not adventurous enough to try baba ghanouj (Middle Easter eggplant dip). It's amazing how drinks and nibbles get newer and older club members relaxed and chatting together so efficiently.

The campsites are just above the sea which had plenty of thick ribbony seaweed and the water was rather muddy, after the heavy rain recently dragged soil down the Irwin River to its mouth at Dongara. Well that's the excuse given
