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**Karijini NP - The Anzac Long Way Home - 17 to 25 April 2017**

Following the Easter long weekend escape at Murchison House Station, we shall embark on an extended journey home via Shark Bay, Coral Bay, Cape Range NP (Exmouth/Ningaloo), Karijini NP and Kennedy Range NP

Combining two LWE's to gain a holiday of 12 days, made of up of only 5 days annual leave (for those who still need to apply for it) we believe it's a great opportunity to see a chunk of the north west.

Continuing on from the Murchison House Station trip for most, we then go on to do 8 nights and 9 days of touring.

The rough plan is to spend 1 night in Shark bay or Coral bay, 4+ nights in Karijini, a chance of 1 night around Kennedy Ranges, and a final night within a day's drive from home around Murchison or surrounds. Most of this is during the second week of the school holidays so we expect crowds at all major caravan parks but the plan is to be at rest areas and bush camping facilities.

Self-sufficient minimalist camping is essential for the remote area travel with a minimum of 20L surplus of each fuel and water.

No pets are permitted on this extended trip due to entering a few National Parks.

### Ninghan Station extended LWE 22 - 25 April

There has been a change to the proposed Holland Track trip. By all reports the track has been heavily degraded by vehicles trying to traverse it during the wet season and there are 3m deep ruts in places making it un navigable. The Plan B is to go to Ninghan Station 380km north of Perth between Wubin and Paynes Find on the northern highway.

The club has not been to Ninghan since I led a trip up there in 2004. There is good camping and plenty of tracks to explore. For the more adventurous there is a challenging track to the top of Mt Singleton.



With Tuesday 25th being Anzac Day if you can arrange to get the Monday off the resulting 4 days gives ideal time to visit this scenic area.

This trip is suitable for camper trailers as we will be setting up a base camp for the 3 nights.

There is no bar so it is all **BYO**.

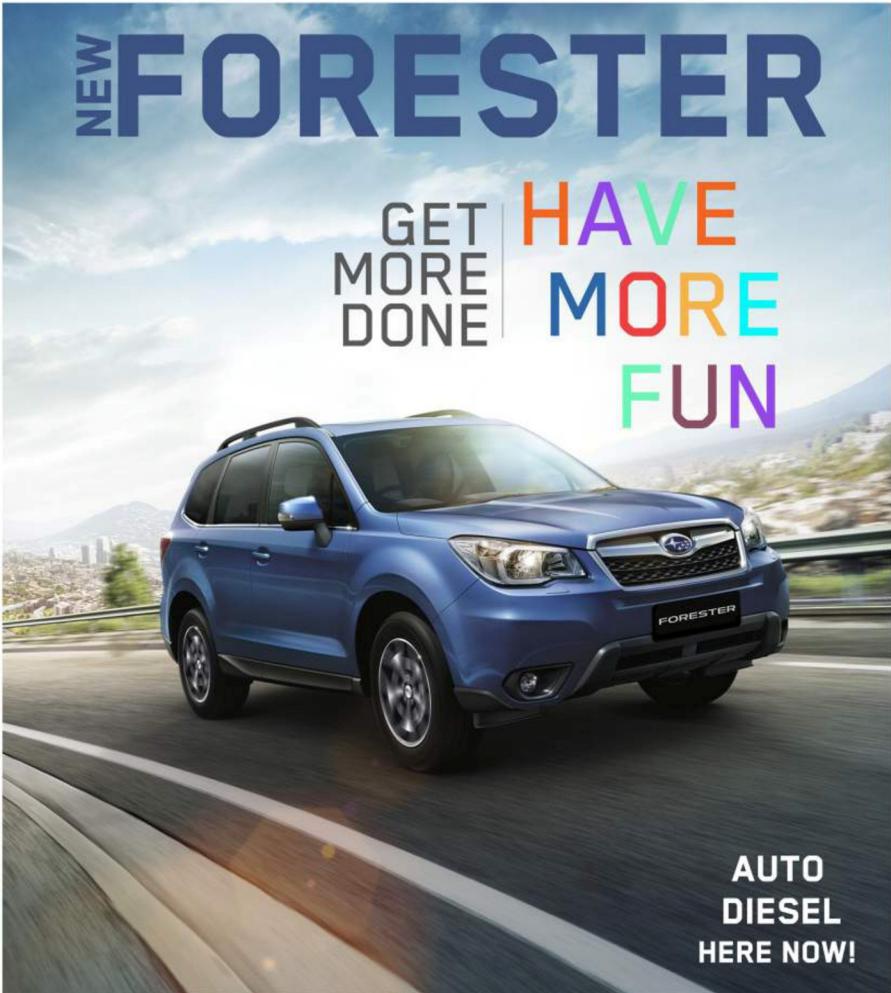
No camp fires in camping area – there will be one campfire organised by the Association.

## TRIP PROMOTIONS/ INFORMATION

### Rudall River Reconnoitre - August 5 to 27

This trip has two sections. Participants may join either leg of the trip. The first leg involves remote area travel for which you will need extra fuel, spares, recovery gear and food and water (some replenishment will be possible at small remote towns).

The trip starts with a 3-day run to Nullagine via Cue, and Fortescue River. From Nullagine we head to Karlamilyi National Park on the Rudall River. This is the largest and most remote national park in Western Australia. We will spend another 6-7 days exploring the rock art, permanent waterholes and splendid isolation of the park before coming out the south exit onto the Talawanna Track and heading to Newman.

Newman is an opportunity to refuel, replenish supplies and relax (including doing our washing). From Newman we head to Lorna Glen station to join the Lorna Glen trip. We leave Lorna Glen and intend to be in Perth on Sunday 27 August. Weather permitting we may take the 40km back exit from Lorna Glen to Wongawol Road and from there to Wiluna.

This is a remote area trip. The trip will be led by experienced remote area travellers who can provide guides and checklists to help you prepare for what will be a great experience. At the least you will need two spare tyres, a tyre repair kit, enough fuel for up to 1000km of remote area travel (there are very limited places to refuel), enough food and water on board for 10 days for each vehicle occupant. Spare parts such as fan belts and fuses will be needed (but some can be carried communally). Recovery gear will be shared.

The trip will be limited to 7 vehicles so there are vacancies for passengers to double up with singles. Drivers will go on a waiting list in case of cancellations.

**Esperance Day 5 Wed Feb 1**

The day started off well. The 1<sup>st</sup> blue sky morning of the trip. A nice gentle breeze flowing through the trees. And the first night without dramas for our tent. We had a lazy breakfast of cereal and coffee, then moseyed on down to the bakery to grab some croissants.

Back at the caravan park we figured out what we needed for the day, loaded the cars and headed down to the Taylor St jetty. We had to wait around for a few minutes while another group got out of bed and get down to meet the boat. Safety brief completed, late comers boarded and we were off. Tony the latest victim of the twitcher twitch was asking the driver about Pacific gulls and something faced what-ever. Katie and Jo were pointing out every bird they could see to Tony, who was

eager to tell them what it was, even though the care factor was practically nil. Keith and Wendy were just chillaxing, and I was looking out for sharks and whatever else was lurking in the crystal-clear waters of the bay.

Half way to the first islands we came across a pod of common dolphins. There were a few of them, including a few babies. They had a bit of a play in the bow wave of the boat. But they weren't really interested in us. I suppose they thought since we weren't feeding them they were going to hang around much.



A few minutes after the dolphin we stopped off at an island to have a look at some sealions. There was a female and 2 pups sunbathing on the rocks. Once again, they were not interested in us. They did let us take a few photos I think one even posed a

little for the cameras. In the past, they would have scattered, as sealing was one of Esperance's main industries. Having filled in the mammal quota for the trip, the skipper pulled away from the rocks and headed for Woody Island.

The water in the sheltered little bay we docked at is so clear you can see all the little critters crawling around the bottom. I have never seen water so pristine. No sediment, a little weed that was have come adrift during the bad weather they must have had out there.

The Kiosk out on the island is a huge open wooden structure, with a tiny museum and a little kitchen attached to it the only enclosed areas there. The split levelled dining room had wonderful views of the water and the beach across the bay, where we had driven a few days before. Morning tea consisted of tea coffee and a wonderful chocolate cake.

Some were eager to go head off and see the bird like that lived there. The rest of us went with the main group on a little tour. Found a gecko,

a parrot, and some other birds. We went up a hill to a platform the over looked the east side of the island and out toward Cape Le Grand national park. We had a brief lesson on the history of the island, the archipelago and Black Jack Anderson (Australia's only recorded pirate).

Jeanette went off with the main group to have a look at other parts of the Island while Jo Katie and I made our way back to the kiosk.



Jo and Wendy went off to have a snorkel around the jetty and the little harbour. Katie sat and read her book, and I went off to have a look at skinny dip bay. The path was over grown in places and the spider webs across it suggested that it hadn't been used in quite some time. The bay itself had no sandy beach, just slippery looking rocks. I thought I might be able to get back via the rocky coast, but after about a hundred meters or so I found the way blocked by a cliff and prickly looking bushes. So, I made my way back the way I came in, well kind off. Because the track is marked very well and the lack of discernible paths I got lost a couple of times and had to back track a little. I did come to a point that over looked the kiosk and jetty, where I took a photo.

I got back with about half an hour to spare before the boat left. Not wanting to go for a swim (where there are seals, there are things that like to eat them), I had a quick squiz around the museum. Not a museum as such, just a room that had a few skulls and other stuff in it. I had my self some more cake and tried to figure out where Bandy Creak was and where we came off the beach. The breeze was starting to pick up and the waves were starting to pick up slightly in the bay proper. I had my self a seat and munched on cake and croissants. What a day so far. I had been annoyed with how the week was going. Not having

gotten the right mattress, the leaky tent, getting rained out of Cape Arid. But here eating a good croissant, looking out over blue seas, cool breeze blowing, nice cup of cordial at hand, all the bad stuff was drifting away.



Just before 1, we headed back down the little jetty. In dribs and drabs the crowd gathered to board the boat. Jo pointed out the bright red star fish she had seen whilst bobbing around in the water.

After a while we were all in the boat, everyone except for Tony. He had been all over the Island looking for some bird of some description, and one of the staff there was helping him try to find it, to no avail. Eventually he appeared out of the bush, tour guide trailing and made his way to the jetty. The tour guide that was with Tony cast us off, and we made our way back to town.
