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TRIP CO-ORDINATOR'S REPORT




Karratha to Alice, Simpson Desert, Coober Pedy and...?

Building a fridge slide to fit a Forester

It can be difficult to find a fridge slide to fit in the rear of a Forester, so I set out to make my own.

This one uses drawer slides with a load rating of 100kg, costing about \$60, some marine ply and a few strips of lightweight galvanised right angle strips. The frame is screwed and glued marine ply and the runners are attached through the galvanised angle strips. To stop the fridge tipping, the slide assembly is bolted to a 12mm marine ply base that replaced the original floor.

Replacing the floor was the first task, which I did so I could install a second battery in the wheel. This is connected via a RedArc isolator switch and heavy cable to the front battery. The spare wheel had to come out of the wheel well and go on the outside, but that left a lot of room for storage of tools, spares and recovery gear as well as the battery.

Building the slide was complicated by having to fit it into a tight space left by the kitchen I had built earlier. This meant using thinner ply than planned, but resulted in a lighter structure – made stronger by the galvanised angles. The assembly is raised off the floor to allow access to the battery and its fuse box. It also gives room to store an inverter, a chair, a table and a box of miscellaneous bits while allowing the fridge lid to open fully once it is slid out. **Stephan Millett**


The trip to the Williams Woolshed and indeed all the way to Mt Barker Bakery was uneventful and the countryside was lush and green. **Cont. p. 15**

Low cloud and high hikes for Porongurups



Arkaroola camp was terrific - all the comforts of home with good company thrown in. The ridge top drive was a highlight (ha ha), the wonder of the scenery memorable. We saw pretty Mulga Parrots, and soaring Eagles. On a walk I trotted around behind Joy learning about geology, but don't ask me to

repeat it. We saw a beautiful Black Hooded Robin, and a Spiny-Cheeked Honeyeater - identified by its pink bill with a black tip. My experiences were marked by seeing birds which I've never seen before and Joy's was marked by the "young" geology" that is rarely seen in WA.

Admiration to Deidre for her epic ridge top walk, and being eyeball to eyeball with an eagle.

Admiration to Daniel for making it to the top of the giant escarpment by the village (Mt Griselda).


On the drive from Arkaroola to Wilpena Pound, this is where we had our near miss with a wallaby. We were flabbergasted to see on a grassy plain, wallabies and grey kangaroos as far as the eye could

see on either side of the road, hundreds and hundreds of them. We stopped just out of Blinman (near Angorichina Station) by a creek bed to gather camp fire wood and it was there hopping along the creek bed that I was delighted to see, accompanied by several Yellow Rumped Thornbills, a gorgeous Red-Capped Robin. Karen and Deidre were later both lucky enough to also see one when they were hiking at Wilpena Pound.

The drive through Brachina and Bunyeroo gorges was spectacular with *Callitris* (Murray Pines in SA) clad sides, and drives through the forest, **Cont. p. 23**



From p. 22 and the first taste of towering cliffs. The return drive through this scenery was just as good, the cliffs were glowing in the sunshine.

Minus 3 degrees on the first morning at Wilpena Pound was a bit hard to take - despite the gloves the fingers didn't seem to be able to work on getting breakfast. Joy and I absconded to the restaurant and indulged in a hot buffet breakfast.

The group tried to find the elusive "GOLDEN SPIKE" – the marker for the lower section of the famous Ediacaran fossil formations. We didn't find it but I agree with Daniel that we were SO near. Mt Chambers Gorge was spectacular, not just for the Aboriginal art but as a record of the time it would have taken for weathering to expose those towering rocks. Sacred Canyon was equally mind-blowing. Clinging to the rocks was a small two-leafed bulb-like plant with the daintiest little lilac flower.

After enjoying a pot of tea out of Royal Albert China at a cafe in Kimba we headed in to the Gawler Ranges. It was rainy and windy when we got there but the site was made beautiful by the presence of a hut and long drop. The hut had a kitchen, which was very convenient to prepare dinner, and three separate rooms which three of us quickly laid claim to. With a towel, kindly lent by Deb, stuffed into the missing louvre hole, I was set like a jelly. Ah, the comfort.

The wind and rain died out and it was a still night making a beautiful camp around a roaring camp fire, under gum trees with a full moon shining down.

The next day, the Organ Pipes were spectacular. Again it turned out Joy was right on the geology: the rocks were volcanic. From there it was on to Streaky Bay, more cabin camping, a farewell dinner, and a parting of the ways the next morning. I was a wee bit seedy next morning so gave waving goodbye a miss!
