President's Report



SUBARU AUSTRALIA JULY GM PRESENTATION BY BRENDAN REED

Brendan Reed, Business Manager for Subaru Australia WA & NT, was our Guest Speaker for the evening. He gave an entertaining presentation celebrating Subaru Australia's 50th Anniversary in Australia. He recounted his own history with motor sports (starting with his parents) as well as the first sale of a Subaru car in 1973.

Farmers loved the renown Brumby ute but other models did not become popular in the general population until the rally success of the all-wheel drive WRX (which stands for World Rally Experimental) in 1992 and Subaru introduced the WRX in Australia in 1994.

Other models followed including the most popular Forester and culminating in the introduction of the new 2023 Crosstrek (replacing the XV) and the Outback Sport or Touring XT. There was some discussion of the new Solterra, the Subaru all-electric SUV. Brendan said that there were global logistics and supply chain issues (especially for computer chips) that were blowing out wait times for the new electric cars.

After the talk, David thanked Brendan and gave him a Subaru 4WD Club WA Cap and stubbie holder. Then we rushed outside and enthusiastically inspected the new Outback turbo that Brendan had brought along to the meeting. Outbacks have always been comfortable cars but this one was large and luxurious and was very good for towing caravans, etc. The turbo on the Boxer engine was impressive as well.

Before departing, Brendan gave the Club two Subaru Australia banners for our meetings and trips. Happy 50th Anniversary Subaru Australia!





JAURDI AND HELENA AURORA RANGES 23-28 SEPT





4WD VEHICLE TRAINING AND RECOVERY DAY 02-07-23 JOY UNNO

Our learning experience began right there in the service station on Gnangara Road, even before we had gotten into the pine plantation. Ten cars and 12 people had turned up on a chilly but fine morning to refresh/and or learn new skills in off-road vehicle recovery situations.

Adrian, our very experienced mentor, got right down to it, literally, as we soon were on our knees peering under the cars to locate tow points. It was a surprise to discover that the newer XVs including my 2017 model, only had two tie-down points in the front.




Adrian showed us the tow pin that came with the car but recommended that rated tow points and tow hitches were to be preferred for towing or snatch recoveries. Adrian's Forester has an impressive double hitch front tow bar, good for bridles which he would explain later.

After a last pit stop, we jumped in our cars and drove the short distance to Gnangara Pine **Plantation**

Driving along the sandy tracks, the first thing that people noticed was the incredible amount of dumped rubbish. Old chairs, couches, rusty fridges, stoves, umbrellas, junk. Sadly, some people were not trained by their parents to put rubbish in a bin. A mob of kangaroos were spotted by the lead cars but soon hopped off into the trees. We stopped along a flat bit of track to air down our tyres. Like some magician pulling rabbits out of a hat, Adrian whipped out his vast collection of tyre deflators. I had my Straun automatic deflators set to 15 psi but I was very interested to see newer models that had graduations marked on them, making them easier to set a desired psi.

While waiting for the tyres to deflate, Uta showed me her heavy duty jump start leads. They looked like they could jump start a truck:)

Continuing on, we negotiated the very boggy entrance track and small dune into the Gnangara Bowl. Lining up in the centre, we faced the series of tracks climbing the sand dune. Under Adrian's instruction, we had braked as hard as we could, embedding our cars into the sand.

4WD VEHICLE TRAINING AND RECOVERY DAY cont....

Adrian then gave us a talk about how to get our cars out of a bog, first by driving backwards and forwards, then by digging with a shovel and pushing. If all that fails then recovery tracks (and more digging) are employed. He showed us the importance of tyre pressures as he invited people to try the hill climbs. Of course, people bogged (and we got to practice all the digging and tracks recovery). Then Adrian told us to lower the tyre pressures to 10 psi and try again. Well, what a difference! All those who bogged previously were able to power up and over the dune.

We had to remember to <u>turn off Traction Control</u> which may be useful in slippery wet or icy road conditions but hinders hill climbs in the sand. Track Control stops spinning wheels and since the cars bounce as they climb the dunes the wheels are always stopping, however briefly. Speed drops and you are bogged! Guy tried out X-mode going up the hill but that also slows the car so his attempt was unsuccessful. X-mode is great going

downhill, especially on a rocky track.







Allison discovered that her camp chair was not rated for sand sitting and we gratefully noshed on Uta's Ginger cookies and Barb's fudge brownies. Adrian talked about the next step - Snatch Strap Recoveries.

Again, he did the magician trick and produced mutiple bags and a box of recovery equipment - snatch straps, kinetic ropes, bridles, soft shackles, dampeners, etc.



Then it was our turn to actually carry out a snatch strap recovery and we leapt to it with enthusiasm - filling up the dampener bags with sand, attaching the snatch strap to the tow hitches with soft shackles, etc.

We did however, forget an important bit that Adrian had <u>just</u> told us at lunch - we forgot to tie the dampeners to the snatch strap with the spare bridle. Hastily, we rectified that and watched the successful snatch. My favourite bit is the two "Toot toots" that the snatcher and the snatche have to do to each other indicating they are good to go.

Thanks, Adrian, for a fun and instructive training day!

FIDDLES N NIBBLES 9 JULY JOY UNNO

Subaru members congregated at Chris & Jim Wilcox's Gnangara home on Sunday morning for the Annual Fiddles n Nibbles Day. Some came with work to do on their cars, taking the opportunity of having experienced Club members at hand to help, along with Jim's well equipped workshop complete with tools and hoist (the Fiddles). Others came for the social morning tea and bbq lunch (the Nibbles). This is a traditional Club trip that has been going on for at least 10 years. Many members have had their cars checked out on the hoist before one of the Club's extended trips up North or to the desert. Lots of second batteries have been wired in to run fridges, LED lights put in, cb radios fixed, rear view cameras installed, sump guards fitted, welding done, awnings or roof baskets installed, etc. First off the rank for the hoist was Uta's White Outback. Uta was doing an oil change assisted by Jim and others.







Adrian had a project to install a water pump on his car to pump water from his pvc pipe water tank on the roof rack. 

GNANGARA PINES PERAMBULATIONS & WALYUNGA NP PICNIC


16 JULY REPORT BY ANN MANIFIS

We then pumped up the tires to highway pressure and made our way to Walyunga National Park – enjoying the scenery of cows, sheep, horses and random traffic lights!






