



## Drakesbrook Weir Picnic n Paddle

Waroona Dam also goes by the name of Lake Navarino and there is a caravan park by that name located there. After driving along very windy, narrow roads through some lovely forest we arrived at the car park overlooking the dam. There was a large stone block with a plaque commemorating the building of the dam. Unfortunately, the view was blocked by a growth of trees so we walked gingerly along a gravelly track to a spot where we could see the water and the dam wall. It was very picturesque despite the dull day and there were motorboats zipping along. It's a very popular spot for water-skiing and fishing but isn't suitable for swimming. Back in the cars, we drove over the dam wall (very scenic views), and down to the bottom of the wall where there was a turn-around spot.



For swimming and kayaking, Drakesbrook Weir, south of Waroona, is the place so we drove the few kilometres over there. The windy roads must have shaken things up a bit as a bracket fell off of the frame holding Wendy's kayak. Fortunately, David Peck spotted it and retrieved it safely.

Drakesbrook Weir, otherwise known as Lake Moyanup, was used as an irrigation dam for crops and livestock using water from Waroona Dam. Now the Waroona Shire have done it up as a recreational fishing and water park with grassed areas, gazebos, picnic tables and BBQs. They are in the process of building a natural adventure playground there as well. (Story continues over page)

When we arrived, there was hardly a soul there and the strong, blustery easterly wind blowing up the water into choppy waves was the obvious reason. It was a bit of a surprise as I had checked the wind forecast and it was OK. Sitting at the picnic tables or cooking on the BBQ was just not feasible due to the chilling gale.

Drakesbrook Weir is also known as the spot where the **Noisy Scrub Bird** was first seen by European explorers John Gilbert and James Drummond in 1842. We did the 500 metre return walk through the bush to the memorial with Wendy Griffiths keeping a sharp eye out for the rare bird. Alas, it was not sighted, not surprising really since most birds would be tucked away out of the gale.

Since the weir was a bust for lunch, we went back to look at a park in Waroona but that was too breezy, so we ended up under the gigantic Morten Bay Figs across the road from the Waroona Pub. The vast bulk of the trees, which were metres across, handily blocked out most of the wind and there were cement picnic tables and benches. I was very impressed with Wendy's set up since the table and benches were a bit spotty with detritus from the trees. She had a long rug with elastic bands to pop over the benches and a big towel as a tablecloth.

After a convivial lunch, Ray and Raun got the tour of all the set-ups in the Subarus as having just joined the Club, their 2011 Forester is "naked" twas a steep learning curve for them as there is so much to consider such as a car fridge, second battery, drawers, tyres, tyre pump, tyre pressure monitors, recovery gear, sump guard, tents, camping gear, etc. Our advice was to borrow stuff to try it out before buying and come to Adrian's Camping and Cooking Training Days.

People then made their own way home from Waroona. Ray (Rabbit) Stewart, Glenda Rayment and I stopped off at the loo in the Waroona Information Centre and then had to look at all the nick-nacks. The centre had a wonderful display of ornaments, arts and crafts, and many other items. I came away with some homemade Rhubarb Chutney.

Although the trip didn't turn out exactly as planned, we all had a good time together out in Nature, and it was an enjoyable day.

All managed to park up in Town Centre despite activity in town due

We spent the next 30 minutes exploring different parts/activities of Donnybrook - local vintage car show, Op Shop etc. Departed Donnybrook at 11:25 am for a pleasant scenic drive, through rolling hills, farmlands, and forest, via Balingup and Bridgetown to Manjimup.

In Manjimup we lunched, stocked up on food, drink, fuel etc. Unleaded Fuel was \$1.88/litre. After lunch, we continued our trip south towards Northcliffe and campsite via the South West Highway and Wheatley Coast Rd. These roads are of reasonable quality and fortunately only had minimal Traffic.

Now we travelled through some farmlands and heavy forest, (mainly Karri, Jarrah and Marri - which was in abundant flower). We arrived at our campsite (Northcliffe Nature Park) on Boorara Rd 4.5 km south-east of Northcliffe at about 2:30 pm.

It was a nice location with lan and myself setting up our large tent on the edge of the paddock whilst the others set up amongst the trees nearby. We had a lovely view across the paddock, dams and creek to the Karri forest. The friendly March Flies provided some distraction whilst setting up our campsites and outhouse facilities.

All campsite set ups were completed by 4 pm, with Happy Hour in full swing for all six of us shortly thereafter. Shane Rudd, the owner of Northcliffe Nature Park, caught up with us then to collect our camping fees and have a chat.

Windy Harbour Road took us to the entry of the **Lower Gardner Road**. This is a sand track which heads east to the mouth of the Gardner River. Here Ross gave directions to lower tyre pressures to 12 psi in preparation for the track – definitely not a road.


Once aired down we set off in convoy for our first stop at the Gardner River campground. On the way some of the sand was fairly firm but we then encountered patches of loose soft sand that required concentration, disengaging traction control and a few revs to get through. Lack of rainfall over the summer months and a lot of 4x4 traffic certainly contributed to the softer track conditions. In some places there were chicken tracks above and around very soft patches. Ross gave helpful and specific directions over the two-way radio to assist our journey.

We arrived at the Gardner Beach Campground run by DBCA. It is a lovely campground under shady peppermint trees with picnic tables, a long drop toilet and a simple, one bedroom hut if you prefer more 'salubrious' accommodation. There were a couple of people camping here but plenty of spaces were available. We enjoyed a morning tea before driving the final leg to Gardner Beach.

A sandy climb was required out of the campground. It was pretty rough with large holes and dips. Ross checked it out and decided it needed some work to fill in several 'holes' on the first hill before we set off. Again, a bit of effort was required to get up this hill. I got up on the second attempt having used incorrect gears the first time. This part of the track was quite challenging having been chewed up by bigger 4WD's. The final section just before the beach was also very dug out. Our vehicles 'rocked and rolled' through before arriving on a beautiful beach.

After exploring around the river mouth, we headed off on a drive west along the beach for a few kilometres. The beach was very popular with clusters of vehicles in places and their occupants enjoying swimming or fishing. Apparently, you can in fact drive right along the beach and exit at Windy Harbour which could be seen in the distance.

After returning back along the beach to the entrance to the track, Ross headed up to do some track work at the start as it was felt we would not be able to get through easily. We thank him for his shovel work that took a little while, but we were all then able to exit the beach and start back along the track. Again, Ross gave specific, easily understood directions for the track conditions allowing us to get through more easily. Those of us waiting on the beach were concerned some of the 'heavies' would head off before us and undo Ross' work.

While waiting to exit the beach a scuba diver appeared from the water with a huge fish that we guessed to be a groper. So big, two people struggled to carry it out of the water and up the beach.



Some more soft sand conditions saw Ross directing us through as we continued the short distance to the campground to enjoy a well-earned lunch. As Vanessa suggested, the campground would be a great location for a future trip.

Exploring the Gardner River on a kayak or stand-up paddle board sounded good in theory until we explored what appears to be main entrance to the water.



Following the track back out to the Windy Harbour Road, we knew from the drive in what the conditions would be like and adjusted our driving accordingly. One spot, on a 'blind corner,' had deep sand that required a right hand turn to get up on a chicken track. It was difficult being unsighted on entry and then lining up for the chicken track. Greg didn't quite make it and was having difficulty getting out with using just recovery tracks. His difficulties were compounded by the CVT transmission not being able to handle the load. Ross came back and proceeded to "snatch" Greg out with relative ease. Having now seen the approach, Greg drove through without too much trouble. Being last in convoy I had the advantage of seeing what the approach looked like and, determined not to become bogged as well, kept the revs going through the deep sand and made it up onto the chicken track. Phew!

We all made it back to the end of the road without further ado and aired up our tyres and reflected on our amazing morning adventures.

We then headed for **Windy Harbour**. It was very popular there with a number of fishing boats out, people swimming and enjoying the water. The weather was perfect. Greg's grandparents used to own a beach hut here, so he and Vanessa set off to see it. They were surprised to find the current owner has it up for sale! He took them inside for a look. Greg and Vanessa now need to win lotto to buy it.

Next, we drove up to the lighthouse car park on **Point D'Entrecasteaux**. The short walk around the cliff top provided spectacular views over the ocean and cliff faces. From here we could also see over the Windy Harbour settlement and a long way back up the beach to the east. From this vantage point, we could also see the smoke from the Broke Inlet bushfire way to the east.



After a while, we decided to go to the local sewerage ponds (just across the road) to look for birds. You might think this is a bit odd, but the birds love the water, and wading birds especially usually manage to find enough food in the water to meet their needs. We didn't have a lot of luck – not many birds found.

It's a great place to visit. Thankfully, we were able to rinse of in the showers provided.

After Lake Magic, we returned to the camp kitchen to watch a bit more cricket on the TV. Then, at about 4:00, we went birding and got a few birds, including the bird I was looking for – a White-eared Honeyeater. We got back at about 5:10 and had a chat to some other campers. At 5:30, it was back to the camp kitchen again to watch some more TV. I also wanted to complete an eBird (electronic) checklist for the birding we had done. Dinner that night was at the Hyden Hotel – seven of us went. It was very quiet. The food was OK, except that, if you wanted a meat dish, you needed to cook it yourself on the BBQ in the dining room! It was a good first day.

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## Sun, Surf & Squeaky Sand in Esperance

We took a 15-minute break and checked out the local store. Varley turned out to be a lovely little town with a lot of history. There was a small **Rabbit Cemetery** near the Rabbit Proof Fence, (a small section still remains today) where all the bunnies that met their demise in the fence's barbed wire are memorialized with beautiful mosaic tiles. The fence was built in early 1900's to stop rabbits getting into agricultural land as there was a plague at that time. A **Chicken Ranch** and a free campsite with basic amenities is located next to it.

It is an extremely large caravan park. There are permanent residents in their caravans with neat gardens and people on holiday. It is well treed for shade with a very friendly atmosphere throughout the park. The local shop in the park is well stocked with supplies and food items. You could even pour your own soft serve icecream! It was where everyone converged in the afternoon to use the internet. We were all happy that we had arrived at the Duke of Orleans where we would be spending the next five days exploring.



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
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
